



Cambia Hills will not be impacted by the IMD exclusion.

What do you need to know about the Medicare IMD (Institutions for Mental Disease) exclusion?

The IMD exclusion is for mental and behavioral health treatment provided in stand-alone settings with 17 or more beds and are not eligible for federal Medicaid reimbursement. As a result, the entire burden of the cost for Medicaid enrollees served in these settings fall on county and state governments.

Cambia Hills, as part of The Hills Youth and Family Services, is NOT impacted by this exclusion.

The Hills YFS, which also includes Woodland Hills Juvenile Justice Residential Program, is exempt from the exclusion because over 50% of our beds are designated to the juvenile justice residential program.

We currently have 30 beds dedicated to Cambia Hills Mental Health residential program and work with boys ages 10-17 and girls 12-17.



Groundbreaking for Cambia Hills of East Bethel

Plans are coming together for the official groundbreaking of our 28 million dollar healthcare facility in East Bethel. This 60-bed facility will be the first purpose-built psychiatric residential treatment facility (PRTF) in the state of Minnesota for children living with severe emotional disturbance.

Cambia Hills of East Bethel will provide the optimal therapeutic environment for children ages 6-17 who are experiencing complex mental health conditions.

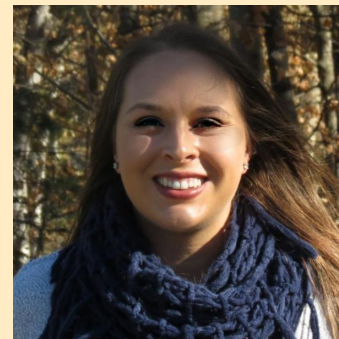
